### November Meeting: Board of Certified Safety Professionals Senior Director Speaks to Safety Majors



Joshua Franklin, senior director for the strategic advancement at the Board of Certified Safety Professionals (BCSP) served as our guest speaker for the November student section meeting. For those of you who aren't familiar with BCSP, BCSP is a not-for-profit corporation recognized as a leader in high-quality, credentialing for safety, health, and

environmental (SH&E) practitioners. BCSP also establishes standards and certifies competency criteria in professional safety practice. After initially discussing the mission of BCSP, he discussed how he begin his career in safety. During his time in the U.S. Air Force, he began to realize safety is more than just following a checklist. Mr. Franklin shared a metaphor at the start of the meeting. He said "safety is like chess because in order to win or get the advantage, you have to advance". During his presentation Joshua also told the audience, safety is more than the recognition and evaluation of hazardous condition. He noted safety is about obtaining management commitment and employee involvement to adequately address workplace injuries. Lastly, during the presentation he placed emphasis on obtaining professional certifications. According to Joshua, obtaining a certification is about gaining a professional credential, assessing your competency, and requires a commitment to lifelong learning. # December 2019 ASSP Student Section Meeting Chris Hall, Safety Resources Director or Training



Mr. Chris Hall is the director of education and training at Safety Resources, Inc. located in Indianapolis Indiana. As director of training, his overall goal is to improve the effectiveness of safety training by focusing learning objectives and audience needs. At the start of his presentation he passed out bingo cards with certain words and phrasing on the card. If

Chris says one of the words, you cross it out and then you win a jar of candy. This activity shows that students were engaged and paying attention to the presentation. Chris said that in order to deliver training the trainer must be competent. The goal of delivering occupational safety and health training is to increase knowledge, and employee hazard awareness. Some training examples include using a child play mat to put trucks, people, cones, and cars for traffic control training and for crane training you can purchase a remote-control crane. Most companies want training that is good, fast, and cheap; however, you can't have all three because it doesn't exist at the same time. There are many training delivery formats which both have their advantages and disadvantages such as classroom and instructor, interactive methods, hands-on, and computer-based formats. Overall, he ensured us that it is okay to not know everything. He also stressed stated that effective trainers should gain the trust of the audience to increase participants learning outcomes.










# **Safety Crossword Puzzle**
