
Safety Management Program Receives National Recognition by Board of Certified Safety Professionals.

BCSP Board of Certified[®] Safety Professionals

As we start a new academic year, I would like to share the following good news. The IU Graduate Safety Management Program is now a Qualified Academic Program by the Board of Certified Safety Professionals. A Qualified Academic Program (QAP) is a degree program in safety, health, and/or environmental practices meeting BCSP standards and whose curriculum has been reviewed as showing a substantial match with the Associate Safety Professional (ASP) examination blueprint.

As a result, upon graduation, students can apply and receive the Graduate Safety Professional Designation (GSP). None of this would have been possible without the support of faculty, staff, and administrators. According to Dr. Slates, the GSP designation is a very prestigious and valuable credential that highlights the rigor and quality of the IU Safety Program. Dr. Todd Smith has been selected to serve as the Graduate QAP Coordinator.

How to Apply: If you have graduated from a QAP during its accreditation period, you must submit a GSP Application and a copy of your transcript using 'My Profile' at www.bcsp.org. For information on QAP's, visit <u>www.bcsp.org/GSP</u>.

Business Continuity Research Project Update

Bloomington Safety Program Participates in School of Public Health Business Continuity Evaluation

Last spring, the IU Safety program completed phase I of the business continuity survey and will begin the phase II this spring. The American Society of Safety Professionals student members in collaboration with the SPH Dean's office are conducting this survey. The BCP is required by the Indiana University to meet FEMA standards for disaster recovery planning and Federal assistance in the event of a disaster.

The plan will decrease the time and impact for recovery and assist School of Public Health Research Laboratories in continuing research and teaching activities in the event of an emergency. This survey is the very first initiative to develop a school wide plan to prepare and recover from disasters. The study findings will be helpful by measuring the assessment of readiness as well as the assessment of need (equipment, space and infrastructure). Interested in participating in our research group?
