Business Continuity Project Information

Each year the members of our student section participate in a safety related research study. This project allows us to use our knowledge of safety as well as learn more about safety application and research out in the field. For the 2017-2018 school year, we worked with faculty members within the IU School of Public Health on creating and administering phase one of the Business Continuity Plan for the building. This project consisted of many meetings that we used to narrow down and determine the best questions to include on a survey sent out to SPH department officials. These questions had to be specially written and designed so we could use the survey results to assess

the level of preparedness that faculty members feel they and their department would be in the event of a disastrous situation.

We were very compelled with our results and are pleased to announce that we will be continuing phase II of the BCP project for one of our 2018-2019 research projects. Phase II of the project is going to consist of going into each department's laboratory and assessing the contents of that area. While assessing the lab areas, we are also going to be generally inventorying all the things that are in the lab. This assessment is also going to be an inspection of the lab to see if it is capable of withholding all of the needs that the department officials are relying on it to. Once this information is gathered, we will work with faculty member Bruce Bare on analyzing the data. We are hopeful that the results will show where the gap areas are within the laboratory, and how well they would be able to withstand a disaster. Eventually, in later phases of the project, the BCP is going to be a set plan in place for the school that will address all of the things that would happen or be needed to happen in the case there was some catastrophic event disrupting the norm.

This project allows us to work closely with faculty members for the University and specifically with ones in the actual school on campus, which houses our major field of study. We are able to use the knowledge we have on safety and emergency preparedness to impact our campus and that is something that we hope to continue to do in the future with this project. Our research team consists of several student section officers as well as several members. Any additional members who wish to patriciate in this should let one of our officers know as soon as possible so they can get you debriefed with all the information you need to know to begin working with us. We are looking forward to beginning and eventually completing phase II of the BCP.

Gared Holdings Research Project: Safety Survey

On Wednesday, December 12, 2018, IU ASSP student members Graham Turner, Isabella Byers, and Natalia Walker met Dr. Alfred Capuano on the north side of Indianapolis at Gared Sports. Gared Sports is a client of Dr. Capuano's and he wanted our student section to have an opportunity to conduct a research project for the company. Students toured the building then facilitated a survey with employees from all departments in a conference room.



The idea behind the survey was for employees to voice their thoughts and feelings about the quality and consistency of safe work practices in their facility. Most importantly the survey was 100% anonymous allowing the workers to feel more confident and comfortable with their feedback. Examples of questions on the survey are... "Is safety better today than it was 2 years ago?" "Would a lead person or manager stop work before exposing workers to unsafe conditions?" "Are the equipment and tools I use safety hazards?" There were 101 responses collected. Students utilized an application called Qualtrics, provided by Indiana University, to document all the responses where it compared the responses. With the data collected, the students then drafted a summary report. Dr. Capuano has added comments and will share the report with Gared so they may understand the status of their company safety culture.


